BALLOT LANGUAGE

The State of Texas requires every bond proposition to include the phrase "THIS IS A TAX INCREASE" regardless of how your taxes are affected.

SAMPLE BALLOT

COLLIN COLLEGE • PROPOSITION A

THIS IS A TAX INCREASE; the issuance of \$600,000,000 in bonds for college facilities used for workforce training, career and technical education, and academic instruction, and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds.

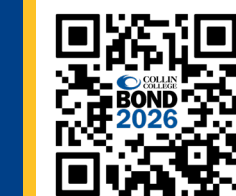

COMMITTEE *of 100*

The Committee of 100 has helped guide Collin College's growth since leading the 1985 referendum that established the college.

In 2026, the committee reconvened to review the college's Master Plan, evaluating facility conditions, workforce trends, high-demand programs, the college's financial outlook, and regional economic impact.

Following extensive community input, open Q&A sessions, and the committee's feedback, the Collin College Board of Trustees called a general obligation bond election on August 7, 2026.

DESTINATION *2030*

In 2017, Collin County voters approved a \$600 million bond to expand educational opportunities across the region. Since then, the college has opened the following new facilities:

- Technical Campus in Allen
- Wylie Campus
- Celina Campus
- Farmersville Campus
- Public Safety Training Center in McKinney
- Frisco Campus IT Center
- McKinney Campus Welcome Center

To prepare for continued growth, the college developed Destination 2030, a long-range master plan centered around:

- Enrollment growth
- Workforce demand
- Facility conditions
- Community input

Adopted by the Board of Trustees in 2023, Phase I includes the college's top-priority projects, most of which are nearing completion. Bond 2026 funds Phases II and III of Destination 2030, expanding educational access in fast-growing communities, increasing capacity in high-demand workforce and academic programs, and modernizing existing facilities.

COLLIN COLLEGE • PROPOSITION A
PHASE II Projects

Prop A includes expansions and new campuses to expand 20 Career and Technical Education (CTE) pathways in high-demand fields.

MCKINNEY CAMPUS WORKFORCE BUILDING

The project includes expanded space for high-demand programs like Construction Management, HVAC, Welding, Automotive Technology, Healthcare Professions, and Information Technology.

WYLIE CAMPUS ACADEMIC BUILDING

Since Fall of 2021, the Wylie Campus has grown 78% in enrollment, making it Collin College's fastest-growing campus. The campus currently lacks lab space to accommodate all students seeking to complete their associate's degree in Wylie, requiring many to travel as far as 30 miles each way to another campus across Collin County. This expansion would allow students in Wylie to start and finish at the Wylie Campus.



PLANO COURTYARD CENTER WORKFORCE EXPANSION

Bond 2026 includes fund renovations to support programming in IT, Web Development, Cybersecurity and healthcare. The CTE expansion helps meet growing demand in these programs while filling a gap for this high-density area.

ALLEN TECHNICAL CAMPUS WORKFORCE & ACADEMIC BUILDING

The Technical Campus in Allen has increased enrollment 56% in five years. Bond 2026 includes adding a Technical Building with general classrooms and labs for academic completers, plus expanded space for Automotive Technology, Diesel Technology, and other technical programs.



CELINA CAMPUS WORKFORCE BUILDING

Celina Campus enrollment has grown 198% in five years. Bond 2026 includes a CTE building for high-demand fields including health professions, welding, construction management, and HVAC, with unfinished space designed for future growth.

MCKINNEY AVIATION ACADEMY

Bond 2026 includes construction of an aviation academy, including a hangar, simulation and classroom space for programs like aircraft mechanics, commercial airline pilots, avionics technology, and air traffic control.

PHASE III Projects



FRISCO CAMPUS HEALTH SCIENCES EXPANSION

This project builds on Phase I of Destination 2030 by expanding unfinished space to support high-demand healthcare programs in endoscopy and occupational therapy. The scope also includes dedicated space for doctoral and graduate-level pathways offered through a regional university partner.

WYLIE CAMPUS WORKFORCE EXPANSION

This project builds on Phase I of Destination 2030 by expanding unfinished space at the Wylie CTE building to accommodate welding and HVAC expansions. It would support growing demand in these high-demand fields.



NEW ANNA CAMPUS

Collin College currently owns 104 acres in the City of Anna designated for a future campus. Bond 2026 includes a new campus offering CTE programs and general classroom space to meet the workforce requirements of this fast-growing region. The campus would be designed to accommodate future growth, with dedicated unfinished space set aside for later buildout.

FARMERSVILLE CAMPUS WORKFORCE BUILDING

Bond 2026 includes CTE expansion at the Farmersville Campus to support high-demand transportation, welding, and advanced manufacturing programming in this portion of the county.



NEW ROYSE CITY CAMPUS

Through a land donation from the Royse City Economic Development Corporation, Collin College has secured a site for a future eastern Collin County Campus. Bond 2026 includes a new campus, offering CTE programs and general classrooms for workforce training and academic instruction, and unfinished space set aside for future growth.

PROP A \$600M

ESTIMATED Impact
Since 2018, the Collin College tax rate has stayed at \$0.08122 and is anticipated to stay at the same rate with the passage of the 2026 bond.

HOMESTEAD Exemption

In 2023, the Collin College Board of Trustees adopted a residential homestead exemption, providing eligible homeowners with a tax exemption equal to the greater of \$5,000 or 20% of the appraised value of their home.



OVER 65 Exemption

The Board of Trustees approved property tax exemptions of \$100,000 for residents 65 and older or disabled individuals.
